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
## Young Scientists Bring Brainpower to May Symposium

#### K-12 Students Get Jump Start on Careers in Research, Break into Print Early

The power and imagination of young scientific minds from Los Angeles area schools will be on display at Cal State Northridge's annual Student Research Poster Symposium on Saturday, May 8.

Scheduled from 10 a.m.-12:30 p.m. in the Grand Salon of the University Student Union, the symposium will feature posters detailing the research of nearly 100 science students in grades ranging from kindergarten through twelfth. Participating students will be available to answer questions about their research.

"The nation's health, welfare and security depend on producing top research scientists," said Steven Oppenheimer, CSUN biology professor and symposium director. "This program starts the youngsters early on the road to careers in research science."



Working with the Los Angeles Unified School District, symposium co-sponsors are the Improving Teacher Quality program, the National Science Foundation, the California Science Project, and Cal State Northridge's Center for Cancer and Developmental Biology, as well as its Department of Biology and Office of Graduate Studies and Research.

Many of the students' symposium projects have been published in the Journal of Student Research Abstracts, an Annual Journal for Young Investigators and Their Teachers. Oppenheimer describes the publication as a "groundbreaking" opportunity for the young researchers to get their work into print.

Oppenheimer, who edits the journal, already is seeking financial support for next year's volume, in which more of the May symposium abstracts will be published. "We also are seeking an endowment that could name the journal in perpetuity."

More than 700 K-12 students have co-authored research abstracts in volume 9 of the journal, newly issued. A majority are from schools in economically depressed areas serving mostly underrepresented students, Oppenheimer said.

Journal abstracts range from the ambitious-Clark Magnet High School's "Analysis of Heavy Metals in and Around the Los Angeles Harbor"-to the practical, such as Portola Middle School's "Which Type of Insulating Material Keeps a House the Coolest?"

Second graders at the 24th Street School investigated what kind of animal life exists in their neighborhood

"besides the obvious birds, rodents, stray domestic animals and insects." In their abstract, they describe the scientific process they used to discover animals they could see only under the microscope.

"We thought that some looked like short, fat worms," they wrote, "...and some looked like gooey snails without shells."

Clark Magnet's environmental and spatial technology class clambered aboard the research vessel Vantuna for three voyages in and around the Los Angeles Harbor, taking sediment and marine life tissue samples. They were after evidence of metal contaminants in the harbor waters.

The May 8 symposium, conducted under the auspices of CSUN's College of Science and Mathematics, is open to the public.

"The symposium and the journal are crown jewels in training teachers to train their students in how to do high quality publishable and presentable research," Oppenheimer said.

### NCAA Regional Track Meet Scheduled for Northridge

### Campus Joins 'Select' Group of Universities Hosting Regionals on May 28, 29

Cal State Northridge will host the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) West Regional Men's and Women's Outdoor Track and Field Championships on Friday and Saturday May 28 and 29, the first time in university history that it will serve as host for the major track event.

Some 800 student-athletes and 400 coaches, athletic trainers and administrators are expected for the meet, said Northridge Athletics Department Sports Information Director Ryan Finney.

As many as 35 different universities from eight states-Arizona, California, Hawaii, Idaho, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington-are eligible to send competitors to the event, to be staged at the Matador Track and Field Complex off Lindley Avenue/East University Drive south of Lassen Street.

"Cal State Northridge is excellent and indispensable to the San Fernando Valley region for so many reasons, including hosting cultural and athletic events like this," said President Jolene Koester.

The track meet will mark only the second NCAA regional competition Northridge has hosted in nine years, said Finney, recalling the 1995 NCAA No. 4 Regional for softball. In CSUN's history as a Division I regional host, softball has been the sport on each occasion: in 1993, 1994 and 1995.

"We are honored to have the opportunity to host this event," said Dick Dull, CSUN athletic director. "We join a select group of universities who will be hosting the NCAA Regional Championships that weekend."

That group will include the University of Florida, hosting the East Regional; Louisiana State University, hosting the Mid-East Regional, and Texas A&M University, hosting the Midwest Regional.

The meet will provide Northridge's student-athletes with a "tremendous opportunity" to compete in front of a home crowd in the NCAA's first round, said head men's and women's track and field coach Don Strametz.

CSUN's Matadors won the 2004 Cal-Nevada Championship team title for men's track and field in April at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, with junior sprinter Rashaad Allen finishing first in both the 100- and the 200-meter dashes.

Allen earned the 2004 Cal-Nevada Championships Male Track Athlete of the Meet honors, and Coach Strametz was named Men's Coach of the Meet.

Prominent alumni of Northridge's track and field program include 18 Olympians, among them Valerie Brisco-Hooks, the first ever to win the 200- and 400-meter races in the same Olympics; the late Florence Griffith-Joyner, world record-setter in the women's 100- and 200-meter dashes; javelin thrower Dave Stephens and three-time Olympian high jumper Pam Spencer-Marquez.

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### **Northridge Faculty Elects New Slate of Officers**

#### Philosophy Professor Ronald McIntyre Voted New Faculty President

Philosophy professor Ronald McIntyre has been elected president of the Cal State Northridge faculty for a two year term beginning in June 2004. McIntyre replaces outgoing president Michael Neubauer, math professor and coordinator of Developmental Mathematics.

Serving with McIntyre will be kinesiology professor Barbara Swerkes, elected to a one year term as vice president, and mathematics lecturer Sister Rita Basta, elected to a one year term as secretary/treasurer. Northridge's new statewide academic senator, librarian and Webmaster Michael Reagan, will serve for three years.



Newly elected as senators-at-large are Cynthia Desrochers, director of the Center for Excellence in Learning and Teaching (CELT); Kristin Ecklund, librarian and instruction coordinator; Lesley Krane, assistant art professor; Robert Lingard, computer science professor; Marta Lopez-Garza, associate professor of Chicano/a Studies; and Debra Sheets, assistant professor in health sciences and coordinator of the gerontology minor. All will serve two year terms.

McIntyre, who came to Cal State Northridge from Case Western Reserve University in 1977, chaired CSUN's Philosophy Department from 1996 to 2002. He was coordinator of the Instructional Development Program (now titled CELT) for two years.

A magna cum laude graduate of Wake Forest College with a bachelor of sciences degree in physics, McIntyre earned his master's degree in philosophy from Florida State University and his doctorate in philosophy from Stanford University.

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### Admissions Director Retires with 'Outstanding' Record

### Lorraine Newlon's Imprint on Admissions and Records Seen in Unit's Technological Evolution

Campus officials, associates and friends gathered at an April 22 reception to honor Lorraine Newlon and her contributions to the university. Newlon recently retired after more than 35 years at California State University, Northridge.

Praising Newlon's "outstanding" service as director of Articulation, Admissions and Records, Undergraduate Studies Associate Vice President Margaret Fieweger said the former administrator "led the most complex body of workers on campus through a period of time in which technology changes she implemented continually changed the nature of work in [Admissions and Records] and provided effective and efficient services to the university community."

Newlon's planning helped Cal State Northridge develop its first digitized student information system, SIMS, which she later updated to the SIMS-R system. By implementing DARS, the degree audit records system, Newlon provided instant, accessible information to students and advisors.

Fieweger extolled Newlon's "creative problem solving," recalling that it allowed the campus to continue operations immediately after the 1994 earthquake. Newlon decided to move student records and the campus' voice response units to CSU Fresno, working with that campus to provide CSUN's students with application, registration, transcript and other services.

Among Newlon's other accomplishments were the merging of admissions and records functions. Her "cross training" of staff in both functions effectively reduced the time between application and admission.

Under the former director's leadership, efficiencies in grade processing, completion of graduate evaluations and the provision of transcripts all increased in efficiency.

"Lorraine would be the first person to say that she did not achieve the accomplishments alone," Fieweger noted. "Her unique ability to work collegially with others on campus allowed these and other campus innovations to occur."

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### **Eric Forbes Named New Director of Admissions**

### **Administrator Moves to New Post After Serving as Operations Director**

Eric Forbes, who has served as director of operations in Admissions and Records since 1994, became the university's new A&R director on April 23.

Forbes succeeds Lorraine Newlon, who retired as director after more than 35 years of dedicated service to Northridge (see story above).

"Eric brings a wealth of experience in responsible positions in Admissions and Records," said Undergraduate Studies Associate Vice President Margaret Fieweger in announcing Forbes' appointment.

In 1980, he became assistant registrar for the university, moving on to the position of registrar in 1983 and the operations directorship in 1994.



Forbes served "a pivotal role" in reengineering Admissions and Records production teams with a point-of-service orientation, Fieweger said. He has created training programs, including procedures manuals and audiovisual supports, to ensure that systems such as SOLAR (Student On-Line Administrative Resources) are used efficiently on campus and that they reflect current academic policies and procedures.

A leader in campus technology based projects, Forbes has served as a consultant to various university divisions as well as other California State University campuses seeking to transition from one student information system to another.

Former editor and associate director of two national educational publishing companies, Forbes introduced data optical imaging to Northridge's application systems and expanded that technology, reducing the time required for application processing.

The new director, who has taught philosophy both at Northridge and at St. John's Seminary College, received bachelor's and master's degrees in philosophy from St. John's and DePaul University, respectively.

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### **Mason Accepts Liberal Studies Post in Wisconsin**

#### Philosophy Professor Ronald McIntyre Voted New Faculty President

John Mason, interim dean of Cal State Northridge's College of Humanities, has accepted the

position of dean of the College of Liberal Studies at the University of Wisconsin-La Cross, effective July 1.

In his new position at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, he will oversee the School of Arts and Communication, Humanities, and Social Sciences. Mason came to Northridge in 1997 to serve as associate vice president for faculty affairs, a position he held until summer 2004, when he was appointed interim dean.

As associate vice president for faculty affairs, he oversaw the university's recruitment of faculty, as well as its retention, tenure and promotion processes.



Mason played a major role in the university's preparations for its WASC accreditation review in 2000. He also was a force in the successful bid for a \$5.7 million Carnegie Corporation matching grant for the Teachers for a New Era Initiative, which seeks to provide a new model for teacher preparation in the United States.

"Cal State University is an exceptional university that has given far more to me than I have given to it," said Mason.

An article on American poet Walt Whitman's "Song of Myself" is among Mason's published works; the piece earned Duke University Press distinction as one of the most outstanding articles ever to appear in the journal, American Literature.

The administrator earned undergraduate degrees in both English and anthropology from the University of University of Northern Colorado, as well as a Ph.D. in English from Northern Colorado.
