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New Programs Train Faculty and Staff to Assist Distressed Students

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CSUN is using two new mental health assistance programs to help distressed students on campus.

While college presents a host of opportunities for students to enrich their lives, students can sometimes get overwhelmed while pursuing their degrees. According to a survey published in "Australian Psychologist," more than 83 percent of college students feel some psychological distress, and more than 20 percent suffer from "serious" mental distress.

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
CSUN is addressing this with new training programs dubbed "Kognito" and "QPR," which are being rolled out this academic year. Harold Hellenbrand, provost and vice president of Academic Affairs, sent out a letter regarding the issue in September.

"As members of this campus community, we are all committed to not only the academic success of our students, but also their well-being," Hellenbrand said in the letter. "Nationally, students are reporting increased levels of distress, putting them at risk for depression, substance abuse and a host of other mental health challenges."

These challenges are the reason Kognito and QPR are being instituted. While QPR is about to hit the campus in February, Kognito's already helping students, faculty and staff recognize those in distress. William Watkins, vice president of Student Affairs and dean of students, told the *Daily Sundial's* Melissa Simon that these issues don't just affect one CSUN student, but in essence, everyone on this campus. That's the reason that these programs were put into place.

"We are also aware of how tragedies like Sandy Hook and Aurora destabilize us all, causing a range of reactions from stigmatization to fear," Watkins said. "Despite these very human responses, as a caring university community, we must continue to educate ourselves about the kinds of disabling conditions that can be experienced by those around us, provide support where needed or possible, and encourage individuals who see something of concern to say something to those who can intervene."

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
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Annual Symposium to Highlight Student Research and Creative Work

An array of topics ranging from the advantages of retrofitting water fountains on campus to an analysis of post-Station Fire debris flow in the San Gabriel Mountains to the regulatory focus on fast-food eating habits will be examined on Friday, Feb. 15, at California State University, Northridge's 17th Annual Student Research and Creative Works Symposium.

The symposium highlights undergraduate and graduate student achievement in various subjects at all levels in their academic careers. It also serves to inform the campus community of the quality, diverse research and creative work that is being done by

CSUN students. This year, 42 disciplines will be presenting. Faculty, staff and students are welcome to attend. Refreshments will be served.

"This annual event provides our students with the opportunity to present their research before their peers and faculty judges in a professional setting — honing their presentation skills before they present at regional or national conferences," said Hedy Carpenter, associate director for graduate programs. "We encourage both our undergraduate and graduate students to get their feet wet and build their confidence and their resumes by showcasing their work."

About 160 students are expected to participate this year. The event will be held from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the University Student Union's Northridge Center. It is jointly organized by the offices of Graduate Studies and Undergraduate Studies. In addition, the symposium has received funding this year from the Associated Students and University Student Union.

The presentations will be judged by about 68 faculty members representing 42 disciplines. Cash awards will be given to the outstanding first- and second-place winners of \$200 and \$100 respectively for the oral presentations in each session. First and second place awards will also be given to poster presentation participants.

"Those who study how knowledge is acquired have known for decades that students learn best by doing," said biology professor Robert Espinoza, a faculty adviser and judge. "The best training we can give our students for jobs, graduate and professional programs and the real world is research with faculty mentors who are themselves active researchers in their respective fields. This promotes student-centered research to students who may not be aware of such opportunities."

"The academic institution is all about the sharing of knowledge," said science and engineering librarian Christina Mayberry, another judge. "This symposium offers a great opportunity for the campus community to learn about research being done by students across the campus."

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


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CSUN Mourns the Loss of Geography's Associate Dean

Darrick Danta '77 (Geography), M.A. '80 (Geography), associate dean of California State University, Northridge's College of Social and Behavioral Sciences, and longtime faculty member of the Department of Geography, passed away on Friday, Feb. 15, Danta was a longtime resident of the San Fernando Valley and an inveterate champion of the Department of Geography. He spent a good deal of his life in the classrooms of Sierra Hall first as a student and then returning as faculty in 1985. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in geography, going on to earn a doctorate in geography at Ohio State University.

Danta served as president of the Association of Pacific Coast Geographers, as well as editor for their journal. He was a fixture at meetings of the California Geographical Society and the Association of American Geographers. He was an active member of the Sierra Club and led many outings as an instructor in outdoor skills.

Students and peers benefitted from Danta's expansive knowledge of Eastern Europe, as well as his exceptional breadth of training in all aspects of geographic methods, tools and techniques.

"The loss to our department is beyond comprehension," said Shawna Dark, chair of the Department of Geography. "Darrick was a wonderful mentor, teacher, colleague and friend. It was a true honor to work with him."

He is survived by his wife, Sara. No information is available yet on his memorial service.

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Second Annual Terry Piper Lecture Features Expert on Student Success

Vincent Tinto, a distinguished professor of education at Syracuse University, will serve as the keynote speaker at California State University, Northridge's second annual Terry Piper Lecture on Feb. 25 in the University Student Union's Northridge Center.

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Piper, who served as vice president of student affairs for nearly 10 years, strove to actively partner with campus colleagues in support of student success as a member of CSUN's executive leadership team. He is credited with reshaping CSUN's Division of Student Affairs to align with the most current thinking and practices that support student learning and success. Piper passed away on May 13, 2010 after a battle with melanoma.

"The event continues the legacy of Dr. Piper's work as an innovator and promoter of applied theory to practice, particularly as it related to accountability of learning and development," said Shelley Ruelas-Bischoff, associate vice president for student life and co-chair of the event.

The event will open with a reception at 8:30 a.m., followed by the lecture at 9

a.m. It is open to faculty, staff and administrators at CSUN. Tinto's presentation is titled, "Student Success Does Not Arise by Chance: A Presentation on Promoting Student Success and Graduation." Tinto's current research focuses on the impact of learning communities on the academic achievements of under-prepared college students in urban two- and four-year colleges.
