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Geological Sciences Professor Richard Heermance Named CSUN's Jerome Richfield Memorial Scholar

Memorial Scholar for his research on the glacial moraines in the Trinity Alps in the Klamath Mountains of Northern California.

The honor is named for the late Jerome Richfield, a dean emeritus and professor of philosophy at CSUN. Each year, an outstanding faculty member conducting research in the arts, science or humanities is awarded the honor so that the scholar may share his research with the campus community. The honorary scholar is granted three units of class time to continue in-depth research throughout the school year.

Heermance, who has been teaching at CSUN since spring 2009, worked with one graduate and two undergraduate students on the research. The research included field studies mapping glacial deposits and collecting samples for dating of the glacial moraines (rock piles deposited at the edge a glacier). The goal was to begin to reconstruct climate change patterns within the last 10,000 years. He credited Josh Graham, a graduate student in geological sciences, and undergraduate students Ryan Witkosky and Jose Cardona for much of the work on the project.

"The combination of the area's poorly known glacial history, combined with the potential to resolve past climate changes in Northern California, caused me to be interested in this study," Heermance said. "I have been thinking about this project for the past decade."

Heermance will present his research at a lecture titled "Climactic Significance of Recent (<5,000 years ago) Glaciation in the Klamath Mountains of Northern California" at the annual Provost's Colloquium on Wednesday, March 20, at 4 p.m. in the Presentation Room of the Delmar T. Oviatt Library.

The professor was attracted to the Trinity Alps because of their scientific appeal and his personal connection to the range. As a child, he visited the range for months at a time, spending entire summers in Northern California and camping in the mountains. As he completed his doctorate, he began to consider the potential research the region offered. Heermance said that dating of the Klamath Mountains glacial moraines (a proxy for when the glaciers were at their maximum extent) has yet to be accomplished, thereby making it a unique project with many implications about climate change.

"I am quite honored to be named the Jerome Richfield Memorial Scholar,"

Heermance said. "I know that there are many excellent studies taking place at

CSUN, and I am humbled to receive this award among so many esteemed

colleagues within the university."

Heermance, who specializes in stratigraphy and geomorphology, said CSUN has

As a result of amendments to the California Child Abuse and Neglect Reporting Act (CANRA) and the issuance of Executive Order 1083 (Mandatory Reporting of Child Abuse and Neglect), all CSU employees now have an obligation to report suspected or known incidents of child abuse or neglect. The university will provide detailed information about the law and faculty/staff reporting obligations, including a form to acknowledge that the information has been reviewed and faculty understand their obligation to comply with CANRA. This form will require a signature and must be returned to a designated campus official.

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CSUN Panel to Discuss the Evolution of Digital Information



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ScholarWorks: Preserving CSUN's Digital Properties

If you've authored a paper or created a video, podcast or tutorial and want to share it with the world, California State University, Northridge's ScholarWorks project is a vehicle for faculty, staff and students to store and provide access to their digital properties.

The ScholarWorks project is an open-access institutional repository administered by staff at the Oviatt Library. The software

captures, organizes, preserves and disseminates the intellectual output of members of the CSUN community. The project is part of a systemwide program, first launched by the CSU Chancellor's office in 2007.

"ScholarWorks provides stable links, ensures long-term digital preservation of work and contributes to the ideals of open-access publishing," said digital services librarian Andrew Weiss. "It also showcases the depth and breadth of scholarship and academic achievement of everyone at CSUN."

This long-term preservation is made possible by ScholarWorks' distinctive feature that attributes a permanent online location, also known as a "handle," to each submission.

"This (handle) will never change, and students, faculty and staff will be able to provide links to their work that will never break," said Weiss. "It will allow faculty, staff and students to permanently cite their theses, papers or other works on their resumes or CVs."

Weiss said ScholarWorks provides an invaluable solution to the Internet's permanence problem including "broken links."

ScholarWorks offers a "one-click" discovery of the research achievements of individual faculty, a department, a college or subject area. The system is also easy to use. Library staff will:

- Create an online author section
- · Contact publishers and clear copyright permission
- Upload legal copies of the authors work
- Provide Curriculum Vitae mining, which extracts citations from CVs at no cost

"Submitting work can be done individually by any CSUN-related faculty, staff and students," said Weiss. "Or they can request the Oviatt Library ScholarWorks staff to submit on their behalf."

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Institute for Sustainability to Host Water Day

In celebration of International Water Day, California State University, Northridge's Institute for Sustainability will host its annual Water Day event on Wed., March 20, in the University Student Union's Northridge Center.

The event, which is free and open to the campus community, will take place from 11 a.m. to 1:45 p.m. with the goal of familiarizing attendees with water-related issues. Wednesday's activities will focus on the health and environmental problems associated with bottled water and the need for access to fresh water in developing countries.

"The Institute hosts Water Day annually to educate students about local and global issues related to water," said Sarah Johnson,

administrative coordinator for the institute. "We plan to engage students in activities and dialogue so they can think critically about this vital and scarce resource."

The day will feature three sessions. The first will take place from 11 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. and include an interactive activity in which participants are given five water types to sample and record their taste findings. After the taste test, there will be a screening of the film "Tapped," a documentary that shows the environmental and health effects of bottled water. A panel with faculty members Yann Schrodi (Chemistry), Erica Wohldman (Psychology) and Michael Alvord (Environmental and Occupational Health) will discuss some of the issues raised in the film and the water taste test results.

The Thirst Project, a nonprofit organization led by college students that works to create awareness and solutions to water issues, will present at the second session from 12:30 to 1:45 p.m. The group will discuss the issues associated with minimal access to fresh water and how their initiative is working to provide water to thousands in developing nations. There will also be a screening of the 2012 film "Running Dry," which chronicles the issues of the global lack of access to fresh water.

From 7 to 9 p.m. the institute will host a screening of the documentary "Over Troubled Waters," a film about pollution in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta.

CSUN's Institute for Sustainability promotes, facilitates and develops educational research and university and community programs related to sustainability. It serves as an umbrella organization across the university on issues related to sustainability and is connecting the campus with efforts in the community. When Carly Marino '06 (Kinesiology), M.S. '08 (Kinesiology) was a student at California State University, Northridge, she appreciated the importance of mentors and professionals in guiding her career. She said the faculty provided great education and insight but she had questions for professionals working in her field of interest.

That's why Marino, now a regional physical activity specialist with the state's Department of Public Health Network for a Healthy California, participated in the College of Health and Human Development's annual Professor for a Day program. She was one of 15 guest lecturers to participate in the event on Thursday, March 14.

"When I was in your shoes," she told the students in her class. "I was always trying to figure it all out, and I just wanted someone to answer my questions."

The guest lecturers were a mix of alumni and community leaders who donned the title of "professor" and shared useful advice and personal stories about how they have achieved success in their profession. They represented a cross-section of the college's nine departments and lectured on a range of topics, including child and adolescent development; radiography; nursing; speech and language development; women's health; organizational health services; nutrition; kinesiology; leadership in recreation; meetings and conventions; the fashion industry; and health administration.

"Programs like this (Professor for a Day) offer an opportunity for students to have candid conversations with professionals about real life experiences in careers," said Marino about the program.

Sylvia Alva, dean of the College of Health and Human Development, said the Professor for A Day program is a "great example of how CSUN shines."

"The guest professors were impressed by our students and the quality of their questions, and our students were able to benefit from the knowledge and experience of many of our alumni and supporters," Alva said. "As leaders and mentors in their fields, our alumni bring a wealth of professional knowledge and career advice to the classroom."

Karen Embrey '04 (Nursing), clinical director of the USC Keck School of Medicine nurse anesthesia program, recommended that students commit to being "lifelong learners."

"Have a vision for yourself," Embrey said. "The secret to success is making little steps everyday towards your goal."

Houman Salem '94 (History), founder of Argyle Partners, a global management consulting firm to the fashion, apparel and retail

industry, told students in a apparel design and merchandising class to stay "flexible and nimble" with their careers.

"The successful ones (students) will be able to adapt to different environments," Salem said.

Edward Daco, a student in the college's nursing program, said the Professor for a Day program is "extremely helpful."

"It has really helped me see nursing from different perspectives and specialties," he said.

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CSUN Math Prof to Take Part in International Frontiers of Science Symposium

California State University, Northridge associate math professor Maria Rita D'Orsogna is spending her spring break this year in India, sharing the results of her research on particle clusters at an international gathering of some of the top researchers in the world.

The Indo-American Frontiers of Science symposium is the National Academy of Sciences premiere activity for distinguished young scientists. Unlike meetings that focus on a narrow area of science, the symposium allows participants to explore innovative research ideas across a wide variety of fields and to develop new networks that they can tap into as they progress in their individual fields.

"It is quite an honor for me to be able to participate in such a program, and it's an honor for CSUN because it reflects on the caliber of work that so

many of us here at the university are doing," said D'Orsogna about taking part in the symposium in Agra, India, on April 7 through April 10.

Attendees are selected by a committee of academy members from among young researchers who have already made recognized contributions to science, including recipients of major national fellowships and awards who have been identified as future leaders in science.

D'Orsogna's research interests include biological swarming, studying how natural agents, or particles, self-organize, or form, into the coherent patterns that are seen everywhere. Her research examines discrete models of self-propelling, interacting agents and the arising morphologies they create as the relevant parameters and environmental conditions are changed. By using statistical mechanics, she is able to analyze these natural and artificial ensembles, their stability and passage to the continuum.

She also uses simple mathematical and physical modeling to try to understand the basic phenomenology driving complex biological processes, which has applications in understanding how viruses work. She is also using mathematics and game theory to understand how the interactions between residents in a community with law enforcement can affect crime, and in particular the roles informants play in reducing crime rates in neighborhoods.

The Frontiers of Science symposium format is designed to encourage one-on-one conversations and informal group discussions in which participants continue in discussions sparked by formation presentations. The goal is to remove communication barriers between fields and encourage collaboration among the attendees.

D'Orsogna said she is looking forward to hearing what her colleagues in others disciplines are doing and learning from their research.

"It's an intellectual exchange of different opinions and different views," she said. "It should be quite interesting."

D'Orsogna joined CSUN's Department of Mathematics in 2007. She has a doctorate in physics from UCLA.

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CSUN Tackles Black Male Enrollment and Graduation Rates

In an effort to address black male enrollment and graduation rates, California State University, Northridge will host the first Men of Color Enquiry and Student Poster Session.

The event, co-sponsored by the Department of Pan African Studies and the DuBois-Hamer Institute for Academic Achievement, will take place on Thursday, March 28 from 12:30 to 2 p.m. in the University Student Union, Northridge Center. The keynote speaker is Frank Harris III M.A. '99 (Speech Communications), an associate professor at San Diego State University, co-director of the Minority Male Community College Collaborative and co-author of "College Men and Masculinities: Theory, Research and Implications for Practice."

Cal State Northridge joins universities across the country trying to find ways to bridge the gap between higher education and black male students. A report published last year by the University of Pennsylvania documents the "crisis" facing black men in higher education. According to the report, the relative number of black men entering college hasn't improved since 1976, and only 33 percent of black male college students graduate within six years.

"It is suggested in the literature that institutions of higher learning in the U.S. have not effectively enrolled, engaged and/or advanced black males," said Cedric Hackett '95 (Sociology/Counseling), M.A. '00 (Educational Psychology and Counseling), a Department of Pan African Studies professor and one of the organizers of the Men of Color event. "We hope to develop some programs and strategies to change the numbers."

He said the event also will begin a dialogue around other issues, including absentee fatherhood, fashion and the spread of HIV/AIDS.

According to CSUN's Office of Institutional Research, as of spring 2013 the undergraduate enrollment of African-American males made up only 5.3 percent of male students enrolled at CSUN compared to 34.3 percent Latino males and 27.8 percent white males. The six year graduation rate for first-time African-American men who entered in fall 2006 was only 23 percent in comparison to 33 percent for American Indian, 47 percent for Asian American, 36 percent Latino, 43 percent Pacific Islander and 53 percent for white male students.

"The value of education among black males, which was once held at a premium during the late 60s, 70s and 80s has drastically taken a decline in the 90s and into the 21st century," said Christopher Holmes '72 (Psychology), staff psychologist with University Counseling Services and head of the campus' Black

Male Initiative, a group of volunteers made up of CSUN black faculty, staff and alumni. He said his group and others are working to turn these numbers around.

Thursday's event will include a question and answer session and culminate with the student research poster session. Hackett,

who also heads a project called "Creating Black Male Intellectual Space," an experiential learning program designed to promote academic achievement in African-American males at CSUN, said the material from the poster session will be used to educate the campus community about the issue.
