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

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Psychology Major Receives Top Graduate Student Award

After facing rejection from 10 different doctorate programs as a senior undergraduate student, **Travis Shivley-Scott** felt defeated. The 24-year-old native of Colorado thought he'd never get into a doctoral program. However, California State University, Northridge restored his confidence that he could excel as an academic scholar.

Today, he has proven himself victorious. Shivley-Scott is this year's Nathan O. Freedman Outstanding Graduate Student award recipient, the highest honor presented to a CSUN graduate student who shows the best record of distinguished scholarship, has made significant contributions to his field and maintains a minimum GPA of 3.5. He has a grade point average of 4.0.

"This is the biggest award I have ever received, and it's an affirmation of all my hard work," said Shivley-Scott. "It truly speaks to CSUN and its graduate programs

because it comes to show how much they can help you improve your capabilities."

In his senior year as a psychology major at Loyola Marymount University, Shivley-Scott underwent an intensive process of applying to 10 doctorate programs but was denied acceptance to all except Fordham University, where he wait-listed. To his dismay, he was edged out for the opportunity by someone else ahead of him on the list.

Realizing his odds were slim, he decided to apply to various graduate schools to improve his GRE scores and gain the clinical and research experience that could help him succeed. Shivley-Scott chose CSUN because of his interests in psychology professor Jill Razani's work in cultural and dementia neuropsychology.

"The graduate coursework in the clinical psychology program here at CSUN has been a lot more intense than I expected,"

Shivley-Scott said. "They teach at a different level, giving me good study habits and improving my scientific research writing skills that I know will really help me as I move onto my Ph.D. program."

This fall, Shivley-Scott will be attending the clinical psychology Ph.D. program at Fordham University in New York — the same school he wait-listed at two years ago. His commitment to helping others combined with his interest in cultural issues contributed to his decision to pursue his doctorate. There, he will be investigating the neurocognitive and sociocultural aspects of antiretroviral adherence in HIV-positive Hispanic adults. He looks forward to moving to New York in the hopes that this opportunity will later lead to a job.

"I chose this path because I see it as a way I can really have an impact on people," said Shivley-Scott. "Improving mental and individual health through a cultural context, I can help prevent cultural biases through my research."

Identifying as African-American and white, Shivley-Scott was adopted by white parents and grew up in Denver, Colo. He moved to Los Angeles at 18 to pursue his original dream to be a filmmaker, but realized his love for neuropsychology after taking a brain and behavior course early in his undergraduate years.

"I've always been interested in culture because of my parents who constantly encouraged being immersed in it, not just ethnically but in any way possible," Shivley-Scott said.

Shivley-Scott graduated summa cum laude from LMU in 2011 with a bachelor's in psychology. He was the recipient of the ACE Summer Research Grant during his time at LMU, which provided him the opportunity to conduct cultural neuropsychology research in the summer of 2010.

At CSUN, he earned a graduate equity fellowship in fall 2011and 2012, and will be graduating with his master's in psychology next week. Shivley-Scott will be recognized during the university's Honors Convocation ceremony at 6 p.m. on Monday, May 20.

"My end goal is to leave a lasting impact on the field of clinical neuropsychology, to possibly teach and to definitely mentor ethnically diverse psychology students," said Shivley-Scott.

Additional Awards

Shivley-Scott is among several graduate students who will receive prestigious awards this year. A new award is also going to be presented to one graduate student. The Mack I. Johnson memorial research award for outstanding graduate student — named in honor of the late vice president of Graduate Studies, Research and International Programs — is presented to a graduate student in the College of Science and Mathematics who has demonstrated extraordinary research abilities and who has been accepted into a doctoral program.

Appointed in 1988 as the associate vice president, Johnson was also a professor of biology at CSUN. He was a respected administrator and advocate for students who wished to pursue graduate studies. Johnson provided support and encouragement to international students and helped establish more than 50 cooperative agreements between Cal State Northridge and overseas institutions.

Receiving the inaugural award is **Darren Brown**, 35, a marine biology graduate student who has accepted a fully-funded Ph.D. position at the Unidad Nacional Autonoma de Mexico in Mexico. After completing his undergraduate degree in marine biology at CSUN in 2009, Brown decided to remain on campus because a bond he established with biology professor Peter Edmunds.

"I never expected to achieve as much as I have, and I owe most of my accomplishments to Dr. Peter Edmunds," said Brown. "If it were not for his high expectations, my graduate student experience at CSUN would not have been as productive as it has been."

After high school, Brown entered the automotive industry fixing car tires and within a few years built a career in tire sales as a regional manager. He worked for companies, both small and large, and was able to start a business with a friend. Unsatisfied with where he saw his life heading, he decided to pursue a career in science where he could find fulfillment.

"My decision to change career paths from sales to science stems from my interest in biology and my ambition to achieve more in this world than making money," said Brown.

Brown will be recognized by name at the College of Science and Mathematics Commencement ceremony on May 21. Donations can be made to the CSUN Foundation to support the Mack I. Johnson research award.

One student is the recipient of the Robert H. Schiffman Memorial Award, which is given to a single graduate student who shows promise in the early stages of their research.

The Schiffman award is based on holding a minimum GPA of 3.5, maintaining a good record of scholarship, making contributions to the field, and will be returning to CSUN the following academic year. This year's recipient is:

Diana Valdez, anthropology major — Her project, "Transforming Identities and Altered Landscapes: Life History of Place at Cerro Bernal, Chiapas," aims to answer how transformations to the landscape may reflect changes in a culture's perceptions and relationships to it and, reversely, how the landscape has shaped local identity. The research will construct a life history of place at Cerro Bernal, Chiapas in Mexico in order to understand how local identity has transformed throughout the life of the landscape. Valdez's faculty supervisor, Michael Love, described her as "the finest graduate student in the Department of Anthropology at CSUN" who "richly deserves to be supported in her continuing studies."

In addition, four students have been selected to receive the Association of Retired Faculty Memorial Award, which recognizes and provides financial support to graduate students for excellent scholarship and creative activity. The award will support a project that is part of a master's program.

The 2013 ARF Memorial Award determining factors are based on a record GPA of 3.5 and have made significant contributions to the field. This year's recipients are:

April Bey, art major — Her project, "The Millenial Natural Hair Movement," explores the subculture-counterculture on YouTube which consists of young women between the ages of 11 and 32 blogging about natural hair. The research will reveal and investigate the African-American Natural Hair bloggers on Youtube and their role in the Millennial Natural Hair Movement through social media's community-based mode of communication and support. Bey's faculty supervisor, Samantha Fields, describes her as an "exemplary student" and "one of the most responsible, conscientious students" in the program.

Edwin Leung, marine biology major – His project, "Population Structure and Survivorship of White Seabass (*Atractoscion nobilis*) in Southern California from 1995 to 2008," explores the effect of temperature on growth rate and survivorship in white seabass. White seabass is one of the most popular and important species for commercial and sport fishing in Southern California and is in need of management despite fishing restrictions implemented in 1994. Leung's faculty supervisor, Larry Allen, described him as an "intelligent, deliberate and dedicated young man" who "is one of those rare students that sees what needs to be done, figures out how to do it and does it."

Trista Payte, English major — Her project, "Domesticism: Sexuality, Maternity, and Domesticity in Contemporary American Fiction," explores both American literature and feminist studies to blend interdisciplinary scholarship that explores sexuality, domesticity and motherhood from a plethora of contemporary American female perspectives. The project examines the apprehensions women feel as a result of the multiple choices they are offered, as well as the paranoia and shame they often experience as a result of the potential to choose "incorrectly." Payte's faculty supervisor, Katharine Haake, described her as "an exceptional writer" who "shows both talent and an edginess of vision."

Victoria Weaver, anthropology major — Her project, "Dietary Ethanol Ingestion by Free-Ranging Spider Monkeys (*Ateles geoffroyi*): An Evaluation of the 'Drunken Monkey' Hypothesis," explores the hypothesis that suggests human proclivity to consume alcohol may have its roots in the affinity of nonhuman primate ancestors for naturally occurring ethanol in over-ripe fruit. The research will examine the dietary role of ethanol from fruit of *Spondias mombin* in free-ranging spider monkeys on Barro Colorado Island, Panama. Weaver's faculty supervisor, Christina Campbell, described her as a "determined and tenacious student who has successfully persevered and overcome many obstacles in her path to her academic goals."

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CSUN Honors Two Student Veteran Graduates with Awards

In recognition of their time and service to the country and to the community, California State University, Northridge will recognize two graduating veteran students during this week's commencement ceremonies—one as the fourth Outstanding Graduating Veteran and a second as the inaugural Veteran Peer Mentor Award recipient.

Hector Martinez '11 (Psychology) will be recognized as this year's Outstanding Graduating Veteran Award recipient. He is graduating with his master of social work with a 3.79 GPA. The award is presented to a CSUN student who is currently or has been on active duty as a member of the U.S. Armed Forces. Awardees must demonstrate an excellence of artistic, creative or athletic nature, or display unusual leadership ability or community service in addition to maintaining a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or better.

The 29-year-old enlisted in the U.S. Marine Corps in 2003 where he served until 2007. He is currently serving in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve. He graduated with his bachelor's degree from CSUN cum laude and decided to continue and earn a master's degree.

"I would have never thought that I would be eligible for an award with this kind of prestige," said Martinez, who grew up in South Central Los Angeles with his immigrant parents. "I'm honored and grateful to be nominated for this award."

As a student, Martinez devoted himself to community service by helping to raise money to feed the homeless, provide services for mental health care and toys for needy children. He served as president of the Social Work Society and helped the Department of Social Work organize a panel of veterans to come and speak at the CSUN MSW fourth annual Diversity Day. He has also worked

with the Children's Bureau of Los Angeles and 5 Acres, two organizations focused on the well-being of children. He is planning a career as a mental health therapist

Ian Smith, 37, who is graduating with a bachelor's in music education with a 3.5 GPA, has been awarded the inaugural Veteran Peer Mentor Award. It is awarded to a student veteran peer mentor who has given him or herself beyond the call of duty.

In 2000, Smith became an infantryman in the U.S. Marine Corps and was deployed twice to Afghanistan. Upon his return to civilian life, he struggled with finding a career or even an entry-level position. When the post 9/11 GI Bill was passed in 2009, he decided to take advantage of benefits and set off for Pasadena City College. He transferred to CSUN in 2011, where he has become an active part of the community as a veteran peer mentor, a position he has held since January 2012.

"I've chosen to take my own struggles and lessons learned along my path of transition from military life into civilian life and use them to help other fellow veterans in any way I can," Smith said.

Off campus, he has committed himself to several organizations that work with veteran issues including Street Symphony, The Soldiers Project and The Mission Continues. He recently served on a panel with retired U.S. Army Gen. David H. Petraeus, former head of the CIA, that examined the general's future role in veteran services. He is also developing his own nonprofit to help veterans. He is a husband and father of two children, with a third on the way. He plans to pursue a career as an advocate for veterans.

Stan Metzenberg, a member of CSUN's veterans advisory committee, said these awards recognize extraordinary students who have "overcome challenges in reaching their academic milestone."

"I'm a big believer in life-long learning. It keeps us fresh and interested in things," said Harrison to about 100 members of the group of mostly retirees. "I encourage you to take advantage of the many opportunities we have at CSUN."

The president addressed the group as the keynote speaker for the biannual event. SAGE—an acronym for Study, Activity, Growth

and Enrichment—is a self-supporting group of retired and semi-retired people who share a passion for learning and meet to exchange knowledge and develop new interests. The organization works closely with the Tseng College to offer "intellectually and culturally stimulating" courses and activities. Many of its members are retired CSUN faculty and staff.

"I feel very honored to have President Harrison at our event," said Joyce Linden, emeritus associate professor from the Department of Special Education and event chair. "CSUN truly shines, and I think SAGE is one of the sunbeams."

SAGE President Jeanne Polak-Recht also presented two CSUN students with the Sonja Marchand Scholarship in Gerontology. Marchand, who was a member of CSUN's staff in the Tseng College, helped launch SAGE. The students awarded scholarships are: Joanne Cecilio and Ragini Kaur, both are health administration majors with a minor in gerontology.

In addition to inviting those at the luncheon to visit CSUN, Harrison discussed her goals for the campus and some reasons the community should take pride in the accomplishments of the university. She has identified seven key priorities for the university: student success; a focus on employees for success; enhancing the visibility of the university; planning for a future less dependent on state funding; increased research activity and sponsored programs; sustainability; and using athletics as a tool for engagement.

"I'm very humbled to be here today and to talk about the many, many ways CSUN shines," Harrison said.

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2013-14 Research Fellows Explore a Variety of Scholarly Topics

Intersections between opera and film in Germany at the beginning of the 20th century, marketplace offerings contributing to consumer well-being, and issues of equity and access within the social context of urban education: These topics and more will be further investigated by the nine faculty members selected for California State University, Northridge's Research Fellows Program for the 2013-2014 academic year.

The program, founded in 2007, was created and funded collaboratively by the Office of the Provost, eight colleges and the

Delmar T. Oviatt Library to offer faculty an opportunity to pursue compelling research or a creative activity.

Nine research fellowships were awarded based on what extent the proposed activity explores creative or original concepts; the likelihood of achievement of the stated outcomes in the proposed time frame; the benefits of the research or creative activity to society; the organization of the proposal; the ability to disseminate the results widely to advance understanding; and the contribution to the field of study or across other fields.

Research fellows are required to present their findings at a colloquium in the fall.

The selected research fellows and their respective projects are:

Susan Auerbach (Educational Leadership & Policy Studies) — Auerbach's research topic is "Shaping a New Common Sense of Education Reform: Policy Discourse on 'Parent Trigger' Laws and Turnaround Schools." Her research will address issues of equity and access within the social context of urban education and will build on her previous work on parent empowerment and school-community relations, extending it in new directions to critically examine the policy and media discourse on parent trigger laws and corporate reform in K-12 schools. She has been teaching at CSUN since 2003.

Maia Beruchashvili (Marketing) — Beruchashvili's research program examines how marketplace offerings contribute to consumer well-being. In the context of weight loss and obesity, her research projects encompass social construction of emotion, overweight identity and consumer goals. She has been teaching at CSUN since fall 2007.

Vibhav Durgesh (Mechanical Engineering) — Durgesh's research will focus on the experimental study of fluid flow in an aneurysm, the abnormal ballooning or bulging of the wall of a weakened blood vessel. His research will aid in developing accurate simulation models of blood flow inside an aneurysm, which is a complex and widely studied fluid dynamics problem. He has been teaching at CSUN since fall 2012.

Martha Escobar (Chicana/o Studies) – Escobar's research involves a book manuscript entitled "Criminalization of Latina Migrants and the Construction of Irrecuperability." In the book, she maintains that imprisonment serves to construct migrants as socially irrecuperable under a hegemonic governing logic by which migrants marked as "criminal aliens" are deported and banned from returning to the United States. She has been teaching at CSUN since fall 2011.

Ellen Jarosz (Special Collections and Archives) and Steve Kutay (Digital Services) — Jarosz and Kutay's research project involves the creation of the Guided Resource Inquiry (GRI) Tool—a learning tool that provides a means for teaching faculty to assemble content drawn from Oviatt Library primary sources as a comprehensive approach to coursework and information competency objectives. This content will form the context for assignments that are constructed using the Document-based Question (DBQ) format, which allows for knowledge synthesis through resource analysis, rather than pure memorization of texts. Jarosz is a librarian of special collections and archives librarian at the Oviatt Library and has been at CSUN since fall 2011. Kutay has been a Digital Services Librarian the Oviatt Library since fall 2011.

Alexandra Monchick (Music) – Monchick's research focuses on completing her book, "Opera as Film." She will examine how film, film theory and film music influenced opera during the beginning of the 20th century. She has been at teaching at CSUN

since 2011.

Scott Plunkett (Psychology) – Plunkett's research involves making cross-cultural comparisons on parenting related to academics and mental health. The project includes combining data that has been collected in numerous states in the United States and many countries using the same parenting scales, academic outcomes and mental health outcomes. He has been teaching at CSUN since 1998.

Ben Yaspelkis (Kinesiology) — Yaspelkis' research on diabetes is titled "Skeletal Muscle Insulin Resistance: The IKK pathway's impact on insulin signaling" and will seek to resolve exactly how impairments in skeletal muscle insulin signaling are manifested and if the defects are reversible, either partially or entirely. The research will focus on inflammatory responses to nutrition and exercise and will add to his body of research on diabetes while seeking approaches to treatments that may improve the condition. He has been teaching at CSUN since 1996.

Michael Neubauer has been named vice provost of California State University,
Northridge by Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Harold

Neubauer brings more than 25 years in higher education to the position. A tenured professor in the departments of mathematics and liberal studies, he began teaching at Cal State Northridge in the spring of 1995. From 1996 to the present, Neubauer has served on the Faculty Senate, and he also has served on the Educational Polices Committee, the Personnel Planning and Review Committee and the Senate Executive Committee.
